OVERVIEW

The Veteran-Owned Business (VOB) Letter and Logo is a TVC business verification program for all honorably discharged veteran-owned business owners who wish to display their business as veteran-owned to all customers.

The VOB program was created during the lapse between Senate Bill 1049 and Senate Bill 938. A period of time in which the State of Texas did not have active legislation for Veteran-Owned Businesses.

ELIGIBILITY

One must meet all four eligibility criteria to **qualify** for the Veteran-Owned Business Logo through the TVC VEP.

- 1. Proof of an **Honorable or General Under Honorable discharged** from active military service, from any branch of the United States Military, National Guard, or Reserves
- 2. Maintains a minimum of 51% veteran ownership
- 3. Maintains a minimum of 51% veteran management control
- 4. Actively operates in Texas

38 U.S. Code 101 (18) - The term "discharge or release" includes:

A. Retirement from the active military, naval, or air service, and

B. The satisfactory completion of the period of active military, naval or air service for which a person was obligated at the time of entry into such service in the case of a person who, due to enlistment or reenlistment, was not awarded a discharge or release from such period of service at the time of such completion thereof and who, at such time, would otherwise have been eligible for the award of a discharge or release under conditions other than dishonorable.



REQUIRED DOCUMENTATION

Be prepared to share the following documentation as proof of veteran ownership and Honorable or General Under Honorable discharge:

County DBA document, and
Ownership Agreement or Form 05-904
Dischauge Decuments:
Discharge Documents:
DD-214 - Member 4 or Service Copy 2, or
NGB22, or
VA Benefits Letter showing dates of service, and discharge type

Non-matching names require legal proof of name change
Examples of Legal documentation showing name change:

DETERMINING VETERAN STATUS

*This process verifies that each individual submitting documents to the Texas Veterans Commission (TVC) in accordance with Section 171.0005(b) of the Texas Code is an Honorably Discharged Veteran of the United States Military. In determining veteran status, we refer to the following:

Texas Code Sec. 434.022(2) "veteran" means a person who has served in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, or Marine Corps of the United States; or (2) the Texas National Guard as defined by Section 431.001.(4) "Texas National Guard" means the Texas Army National Guard and the Texas Air National Guard.

38 U.S. Code 101-(2) "veteran" means a person who served in the active military, naval, or air service, and who was discharged or released therefrom under conditions other than dishonorable.

13CFR 125.11 further states, "A reservist or member of the National Guard called to Federal active duty or disabled from a disease or injury incurred or aggravated in line of duty or while in training status also qualify as a veteran."
